Efren Villanueva, the Business Advisor/Site Manager, conducted practice interviews with Charity to prepare her for an actual interview.

Charity received assistance with the First Street Methodist Mission's Career Closet, who provided her with interviewing clothes, including a beautiful brand new suit that looked like it was made especially for her. Another partnership, The T (Fort Worth Transit), helped with transportation, so Charity could go to job interviews and meet with her Counselor at JCEP.

Recently, I met with Charity at the Job Connection Education Program's Job Fair held at the 56th IBCT, in Fort Worth. The first thing I noticed was the change in Charity's countenance. She was smiling, holding her head high, and laughing, and she looked absolutely beautiful in her business suit. She presented herself to the employers in a professional and confident manner. I could see that Charity recognized her own value and worth and employers did also. When speaking about what JCEP has done for her, Charity stated, "JCEP has helped me with everything! I've been through a lot and you [JCEP] helped so I can rest a little. You [JCEP] helped provide stability that I'm looking for."

Through JCEP's assistance and Charity's own skills, she was hired by FedEx, as a Package Handler, and is now attending Everest College, seeking a degree in Business Administration. One day, Charity hopes to be her own boss by owning a Real Estate office.

I asked Charity, "What is the one thing you would like others to know about JCEP?" She quickly replied, "Go and do everything you can to be a part of JCEP. The more you're a part of it, the more you benefit." When asked if she had any additional comments, Charity said, "Thank you. Thank you. Thank you. I can't say it enough." Today, she and her son are preparing to move in to their first apartment. For the first time in a very long time Charity now has hope, confidence in herself, and believes that tomorrow will be even better than today.
